

A flagship programme of the ASEAN that manages a regional network of representative protected areas created to generate greater collaboration between ASEAN Member States in preserving their shared natural heritage









A protected area of high conservation importance preserving in total a complete spectrum of representative ecosystems of the ASEAN Region.

Criteria for AHPs

1) Ecological Completeness

 intact ecological processes and capability to regenerate with minimal human intervention

2) Representativeness

•embodies the variety of ecosystems or species representing or typical of the particular region

3) Naturalness

 must be, for the most part, in a natural condition such as a second growth forest or a rescued coral reef formation, with the natural processes still going on



Criteria for AHPs

4) High Conservation Importance

- •has global significance for the conservation of important or valuable species, ecosystems or genetic resources
- •creates or promotes awareness of the importance of nature, biodiversity and the ecological process

5) Legally Gazetted Conservation Areas

•must be identified, defined and allocated by law or any legally accepted instrument of the ASEAN Member States

6) Approved Management Plan





Strengthen communication and promotion strategies


